From Rags to Riches

(By Sally Ellis)

You may have never heard of Howard Schultz, but most likely you know the company he transformed. Born into a poor family in New York in 1953, his number one goal in life was to succeed and build a brighter future, and he fought hard at school to achieve good grades.

Schultz later proved to be a natural at sports, and was offered a free place at university because of his ability. After graduation Schultz did sales for a small coffee-maker company, as well as for other companies, and was promoted quickly there. Eventually he became an advertising manager for a coffee bean company with a few stores in Seattle. The name of this small chain? Starbucks.

On an Italian trip, Schultz was impressed by the café culture there, and suggested Starbucks open coffee shops where people could socialize and chat comfortably. Even when the top managers doubted that ideas would suit their organization, they sometimes allowed their staff to carry them out; and the American public loved Schultz's idea. He then left and returned to Starbucks twice, eventually becoming president of the enterprise, expanding it across the USA and further, incorporating it into 39 countries by 2012. Ironically, some neighboring Starbucks stores have closed because they were competing with each other. Soon after, Schultz was listed in Forbes Magazine as one of America's richest.

Schultz has used any power he had in positive ways since he climbed to the top of his company, and once famously criticized an investor for being against gay marriage, even suggesting he spend his money boosting another company. He received an award for never lying at work, and was invited to teach a course on fair business practices at an American university. 
Useful Practice: Rereading James King Librarian at Mount City Middle School

Rereading is the act of reading a book, article, or any written material again after having already read it once. It is a common practice among readers who wish to gain a deeper understanding of a text, refresh their memory, or simply enjoy a book they love once again. Rereading is also beneficial for language learners. By rereading a text, learners can improve their vocabulary, comprehension, and fluency. Rereading can also be used as a tool for academic or professional purposes, such as studying for an exam, writing a paper, or preparing for a presentation.

When rereading a text, readers may notice things they missed during their first reading. This is because rereading allows the reader to focus on the details of the text rather than on the plot or overall structure. The reader may find new insights, connections, or meanings that were not apparent before. Additionally, rereading often helps readers identify patterns or themes that were not obvious during their initial reading. Thus readers can also develop their critical thinking skills by analyzing the text and forming their own opinions and interpretations.

However, rereading also has its downsides. It is time-consuming, especially for longer texts. It can also become monotonous or boring because it is not active. Moreover, rereading is not necessarily effective in proportion to frequency, as the graph shows.

In conclusion, though it may not always be necessary or effective, rereading is a useful practice that helps readers gain a deeper understanding of a text, improve their language skills, and develop their critical thinking ability.



Effective Reading Strategy: Interactive Reading Eric Brier

Professor at Mount City University

Interactive reading refers to the process of engaging with a text through active participation and dialogue. Unlike passive reading, where one simply consumes the words on the page, interactive reading requires the reader to think critically, ask questions, and form connections with the material.

To read interactively, one must approach the text with an open and curious mind. Rather than simply accept the information presented, the reader should actively seek to understand and interpret it. This involves asking questions, making predictions, and connecting the material to one's own experiences and knowledge.

One effective way to engage in interactive reading is through annotation (making a mark or a note), as with the examples below. By doing so, the reader can better remember the material and make deeper connections to it. Annotation also helps the reader to identify key themes and ideas in the text, which can aid in comprehension.

Examples of annotation

Highlighting: marking important parts with a colored pen drawing a line beneath key words or phrases Underlining: Margin notes: writing comments or questions in the text

Sticky notes: attaching small notes

Another way to engage in interactive reading is through discussion with others, which involves book clubs, classroom discussions, or informal conversations with friends. By discussing the text with others, readers can gain new perspectives and insights, as well as reinforce their own understanding of the material.

However, there are also some disadvantages to interactive reading. Firstly, it takes a lot of time, especially if the discussion or activities are extensive. This is not favorable for individuals with busy schedules or limited time. Secondly, interactive reading can also be distracting to the reading process itself, as it often shifts the focus away from the text and towards the discussion or activity. Lastly, the interpretation and analysis of the text may be influenced by the opinions and perspectives of the group, which can limit individual understanding and critical thinking.



In summary, high school students should be permitted to take part-time jobs.

One reason why many young university graduates struggle to find a suitable job immediately is that many jobs require several years of work experience. However, that is exactly what new graduates lack. A recent survey of jobs listed on a popular employment website showed that 35% of entry-level jobs required at least three years of relevant work experience. These are not technical or specialist jobs, they are jobs that require very few skills. It is this requirement that prevents many capable young people from entering the job market. In times of recession, or when applying for jobs in competitive markets, a few years of work experience can make the difference. This is why teachers and parents should encourage teenagers to take on some work as early as possible. In particular, communication and customer service skills are popular with employers, so a part-time job in a customer-facing role is ideal.

The earth contains more species of organisms than animal species, including us humans. Typical examples are fungi, of which there are estimated to be 1.5 to 5 million species, compared to only about 1.5 million animal species. This is partly due to the fact that fungi are highly adapted to their environment and can live in a wider range of places than animals. Fungi are also able to reproduce both sexually and non-sexually, which gives them a greater capacity to evolve and diversify. Of all the fungi, perhaps the most familiar to us are mushrooms.

When we were young, we may have seen red and white mushrooms in fairy tales and other stories. There are different opinions as to what these mushrooms are, but the most promising is fly agaric. It has a red pileus (cap) that is typically between 5-15 cm wide and a white stem that can grow up to 20 cm tall. This makes it one of the most easily recognizable types of mushrooms. It is originally from northern Europe, but now it is found in many different regions around the world, ranging from temperate forests to the cold and damp forests of the northern areas.

Fly agaric has played an important role in many cultures and traditions, from being depicted in folklore and fairy tales to being used in religious ceremonies. In some cultures, it was believed to have spiritual and healing powers. The Vikings are said to have used it to feel brave before battle. In Hindu texts, it is mentioned as "soma" and believed to have been used in religious rituals to communicate with the gods.

Fly agaric is attracting attention for its medicinal properties. One of the chemicals that have been recently studied in fly agaric is ibotenic acid. This substance has been linked to learning and memory, and it could be helpful in treating various nervous disorders such as Parkinson's and Alzheimer's

diseases. In addition, fly agaric contains several substances that are being studied for their potential usefulness in the treatment of various organ diseases, including cancer and liver disease.

Fly agaric is also known as *Amanita muscaria* in scientific terms. It is part of the genus *Amanita*, which includes other well-known species like death cap. Fly agaric is a type of fungus called mycorrhizal, which means that it needs a tree to survive. They need each other to exist because the tree absorbs nutrients from the soil through the fungus, while the fungus receives sugars and other nutrients from the tree.

The fly agaric fungus grows beneath the ground, and only the mushrooms, or fruiting bodies, can be seen above ground. It is considered to be an annual fungus, which usually grows once a year and then dies, but the mycelium remains underground and is able to produce new fruiting bodies the following year. The growth and reproduction of fly agaric is closely tied to environmental factors such as temperature, moisture, and light.

The body mechanics of the fly agaric are unique. It has a bright red pileus, which is covered with white spots called scales. It releases tiny single-celled structures called spores that spread into the environment to settle on new growth areas. The spores are white and located on the gills under the pileus. The mushroom stands tall on a thick stem, which is usually white or cream in color, and has a cup-like structure at the base called a volva. It also has a distinctive ring-like structure around the stem called the annulus, which also serves as one of the main characteristics of the mushroom.

Although fly agaric has cultural significance and potential medicinal benefits, it's important to remember that it is a poisonous mushroom. Eating too much of it can lead to serious illness or even death. Therefore, it's essential to be careful and seek advice from professionals before attempting to use fly agaric for any purpose. Nevertheless, the unique qualities of this fungus will continue to fascinate and inspire scientists and mushroom fans alike.


