(A) Early Baseball Gloves

In the early days of professional baseball in the US, players played barehanded because it was considered unmanly to use gloves. In 1875, a pitcher named Charles Waitt, who had injured his hand, became the first professional to wear a glove. A few other players began wearing them, but many fans called it shameful. In 1877, though, the highly respected player Albert Spalding started wearing one. This influenced many other players to use one, and fans gradually accepted this change.

By 1895, so many players were using gloves that it became necessary to introduce regulations regarding their use. Because catchers and first basemen had to use their gloves the most, it was decided that they could use larger gloves with more padding. Other gloves, however, had to remain small and offered only a little protection. Since then, baseball gloves have become much more comfortable.

(B) Gated Communities

Millions of Americans live in gated communities, where access is restricted by gates, walls, and security guards. Such places tend to be safer than open neighborhoods when first built. Over time, however, their crime rates usually rise until they are almost the same as the areas around them. Critics of gated communities say security guards are poorly paid, so they are unlikely to stay alert. Moreover, many delivery services have access to the security codes for

the gates, and these can be obtained by criminals.

Since gated communities have high annual fees, they generally attract wealthier residents. This creates social divisions by leaving poorer people outside the walls. Gated communities can also affect standards of living and the range of facilities in surrounding areas. Residents of a gated community with a private park, for example, may vote against funding the construction of a new public park by the city.

If you want to have your own business, opening a franchise may seem like a fairly safe way to do so. Large retail companies offer new franchise owners a well-known brand with an existing customer base, technical support, and training. Moreover, because large retail companies can order a lot of supplies at the same time, franchise owners can often get them at a discount.

However, many people underestimate the expense of opening a franchise. As well as initial costs, owners must purchase equipment and pay for advertising. Therefore, franchise owners should be prepared to lose money for the first six months. People interested in opening franchises must also consider their own personalities; they may not like the fact that many business decisions are made by managers working at company headquarters. Also, those who want to try new things may dislike the fact that franchise agreements do not allow them to do so.

(D) Qalupalik

The Inuit, a native people that live in the Canadian Arctic, tell their children frightening stories about creatures called Qalupalik. These wicked, greenskinned, humanlike creatures are said to live beneath the sea ice and are able to swim like fish. They also wear fur coats just like those used by Inuit mothers for carrying children on their backs. Qalupalik are believed to kidnap children playing near the shore and take them to live under the sea, feeding on

their life energy in order to stay youthful forever.

The stories about Qalupalik are thought to have originated as a way for parents to prevent their children from playing on the dangerous ice. Children can easily drown if they fall through, so telling them that there are evil Qalupalik there is an effective way to keep children away from the ice.

(E) Snakes and Lizards

In 2015, researcher Michael Caldwell was studying some 167-million-year-old fossil skeletons. Earlier analysis had classified these fossils as lizards. Upon close examination, however, Caldwell realized some of the fossils were actually snakes. At that time, the oldest known snake fossils were just 100 million years old. As a result of Caldwell's discovery, we now know that snakes have existed for over 160 million years.

Because the skeletons were not complete, it was extremely difficult to identify the bones properly. This caused the skeletons to be incorrectly classified as lizards in the first place. However, Caldwell was able to identify the snakes based on their jaw structure. Snakes' jaws are extremely flexible, allowing them to swallow animals that are much larger than their heads, while lizards' jaws do not open nearly as wide.

The small city of Takoma Park, Maryland, has a serious problem. When traffic jams or road closings occur on nearby highways, GPS navigation software in cars and smartphones sends thousands of drivers onto its quiet residential streets. This increase in vehicles makes it hard for Takoma Park residents to get home, and it puts the safety of local children at risk.

When GPS software calculates routes for drivers, it often relies on drivers to send it traffic reports, so some Takoma Park residents decided to send in fake reports of traffic jams in their neighborhood to the GPS software. By reporting traffic jams that did not exist, residents hoped to stop the software

from recommending shortcuts through their neighborhood. Navigation software makers, however, want to stop people from sending in fake reports.
