Experts agree that genetics and the makeup of a population affect height. But they also suggest that the average height of a population is diet-related. They conclude that the American diet—high in processed foods and additives—is lacking in nutrition, which affects growth.

Access to health care also influences how tall people are. European and Asian nations with national health care systems have experienced an increase in average height. America, however, has millions of people without access to health care, and this is reflected in a steady decline of their average height.

Routemasters were introduced in the 1950s to replace trolley buses. They were perfectly suited for London's busy streets. Passengers could get on and off quickly at convenient spots, and friendly conductors issued tickets on the

move. The Routemasters' most popular features were the open entrance platforms at the rear and the conductors.

Why were these symbols of London phased out? According to officials, Routemasters were not wheelchair-accessible, their lack of doors made them unsafe, and the new one-man operated buses are cheaper. These may be good reasons, but many people regret that one of London's most memorable features is gone forever.

## (C) Taking Tests

Most people experience some degree of nervousness before taking a test: sweating and shortness of breath are common. Such nervousness, called test anxiety, can negatively affect an examinee's test performance.

Some doctors treat test anxiety as an illness, prescribing medication, psychological therapy, and even hypnosis for treatment. Other medical researchers, though, say such methods should be reserved only for severe cases of test anxiety. They argue that test anxiety is normal, and most people can make efforts to reduce it.

One way is by eating some fruits and vegetables before any exam since they help to relieve stress and maintain mental alertness. Researchers also suggest arriving early to exams, and not discussing the upcoming test with other examinees.

It is important to remember, however, that a little anxiety can be beneficial, as long as it is controlled. Anxiety can be a source of energy to keep the brain active, alert, and focused.

For many years, European consumers could only buy flowers in season. Now, thanks to the global economy, Europeans can buy cut flowers from Asia, South America, the Middle East, and Africa at any time.

Because of its year-round warm climate and good soil, Kenya has a strong

flower industry. Kenyan flower exports have doubled in volume over the last 10 years, and expansion is running at 20 percent per year. Flower growing is an important economic sector for Kenya, being the third-biggest foreign exchange earner after tea and tourism. With 50,000 workers, it is also a significant employer.

The industry has problems, however. Environmental groups are concerned that the flower growers are overusing Lake Naivasha, the huge freshwater lake that supplies water for flower farms. Overuse of chemicals and harsh working conditions on the farms are also serious concerns. Unless Kenya can address these issues, its flower industry could be headed for trouble.

## (E) Saving Lives on the Roads

Injuries and deaths from traffic accidents in industrialized countries have fallen since the 1960s, mainly due to advances in safety technology like seat belts and air bags. Worldwide, however, the numbers continue to rise. To address this, the World Health Organization is urging countries to focus more on modifying the habits that lead to accidents in the first place.

Getting drivers to change their behavior can have significant results. Road designs that limit vehicle speed and automatic cameras that monitor speeding have reduced the number of collisions in the Netherlands. In Australia, random police checkpoints that test drivers' alcohol levels have lowered the number of traffic accidents.

Drivers often complain that such steps limit their individual freedom. However, the World Health Organization estimates that millions of lives would be saved worldwide if governments introduced stricter laws.

But it wasn't always this way. Native to Africa, coffee beans appear regularly in that continent's legends. However, it wasn't until Arab traders took them to what is now modern-day Yemen — over 1,000 years ago — that the beans were roasted, ground into powder, and then mixed with hot water to create a coffee beverage. Over the centuries, coffee houses spread throughout Muslim countries and into Europe, but Arab traders kept the coffee market tightly controlled.

In 1616, the Dutch managed to take a coffee plant out of Yemen. The biggest development in coffee's history soon followed. European nations could now grow their own coffee plants, and before long they had established large-scale coffee plantations throughout Asia and South America. The resulting international trade led coffee to become the global drink it is today.
